Executive Summary

The Inland Adult Education Consortium (IAEC) is located in California's Inland Empire and spans a diverse geography that includes urban, suburban, and rural communities. Situated within San Bernardino County—the largest county in the United States—IAEC is one of five California Adult Education Program (CAEP) consortia operating in the county. The Consortium now comprises nine Member districts: Colton Joint Unified School District, Redlands Unified School District, Rialto Unified School District, San Bernardino City Unified School District, Yucaipa-Calimesa Joint Unified School District, San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools, Crafton Hills College, San Bernardino Valley College, and Rim of the World Adult Education, which officially joined in 2025.

In keeping with the Collective Impact approach that emphasizes regional cooperation, IAEC continues to center collaboration in all decision-making. This Annual Plan serves as a foundational document guiding the Consortium's efforts to advance the vision of building regional stability among adult education providers. IAEC aligns closely with the San Bernardino County Workforce Development Board's Vision2Succeed initiative and actively partners with local government agencies, employers, and community-based organizations to foster a coordinated regional system of adult education. This collaboration supports adults in gaining the tools, training, and support needed to procress along educational and career pathways.

The 2025–2028 Three-Year Plan builds upon IAEC's accomplishments during the previous implementation period. It incorporates updated demographic, labor market, and programmatic data to refine strategies that meet the region's evolving educational needs. IAEC has reaffirmed its commitment to four priority program areas: High School Diploma/High School Equivalency, Basic Skills, Career and Technical Education (CTE), and English as a Second Language (ESL). These areas were identified as having the most significant unmet needs for adult learners across the region.

During the 2022–2025 period, the community college partners successfully scaled up noncredit basic skills math programs and expanded the role of counselor/transition specialists to support student pathways from noncredit to credit coursework and from adult schools to postsecondary and workforce opportunities. This momentum will carry forward as IAEC continues to embrace region-wide collaboration on assessment and placement systems, improved use of student data in program design, expanded CTE offerings, and accelerated learning opportunities.

The demographic profile of the Inland Empire reflects continued population growth, increased linguistic diversity, and expanding needs among working-age adults without a high school diploma or postsecondary credential.

According to the most recent American Community Survey and U.S. Census data, the region is among the fastest growing in the nation, driven by affordable housing, a younger population, and employment expansion in multiple sectors. However, significant numbers of residents face barriers to full economic participation due to limited educational attainment, English language proficiency, or access to workforce training.

Research from the Centers of Excellence continues to guide IAEC's program alignment with local economic demand. The top five industry sectors contributing to job growth through 2027 in the Inland Empire subregion include Government, Health Care and Social Assistance, and Administrative and Support Services, accounting for over 32% of total projected job growth. These trends reinforce the Consortium's emphasis on workforce-aligned CTE programming and transitions to employment.

IAEC remains firmly aligned with the CAEP State Priorities and AB104 Objectives and Program Areas. The Executive Committee affirms that adult education plays a critical role in advancing community equity, economic mobility, and regional prosperity. As the Inland Empire continues to rebound from the COVID-19 pandemic, IAEC is committed to delivering high-quality services that help learners adapt, thrive, and contribute to a revitalized regional economy.

An Annual Plan Retreat was held on May 28, 2025, with participation from all Member Districts, community partners from across the Inland Empire. The outcomes of this retreat are reflected in this Annual Plan and form the blueprint for the next phase of regional adult education implementation.

How will you measure effectiveness/progress toward meeting this need? *

IAEC Member Districts engage in ongoing analyses to identify and remediate gaps in services and make targeted adjustments with each Member District to support career and academic pathways that lead to increased wages and/or transitions to postsecondary institutions. The IAEC Executive Committee affirms that Adult Education is a critical lever in promoting community equity across the Inland Empire. To ensure a data-informed and inclusive planning process, the Consortium has conducted multiple planning sessions with Member Districts and community partners—utilizing a professional facilitator to guide the discussions. These activities included consensus-building workshops, steering committee meetings, labor market information (LMI) analysis, and alignment with statewide initiatives.

During these sessions, Gaps in Services were identified and validated through collaborative processes involving all IAEC Member Districts and partners. These identified needs inform both programmatic design and resource allocation across the region. To ensure meaningful progress toward closing these gaps. IAEC will implement a multi-layered evaluation framework. This includes:

- · Quarterly progress reviews by the Executive and Steering Committees using standardized metrics aligned to the CAEP DataVista Dashboard and the Three-Year Plan goals;
- · Performance reports comparing enrollment, measurable skill gains, postsecondary transitions, and employment outcomes by Member Districts and priority program area;
- · Student-level outcome tracking through the use of CASAS, TOPSpro, and MIS (aggregated in DataVista) data to monitor gains in literacy, high school equivalency attainment, and credential completion;
- · Partner feedback loops through surveys and focus groups to assess service alignment, access, and satisfaction among adult learners and community stakeholders;
- Gap closure monitoring that compares baseline and year-over-year performance in the areas of Basic Skills, ESL, CTE, and High School Diploma/Equivalency, particularly among populations with the highest barriers to participation.

These measures will allow IAEC to continuously assess effectiveness, adjust strategies as needed, and ensure that program delivery remains responsive to both student needs and labor market demand. Additionally, during the 2025–2026 implementation year, Rim of the World USD will officially join the Consortium and participate in the planning phase for full integration as a funded Member. Rim of the World will be included in all evaluative efforts to ensure alignment with Consortium-wide goals and regional benchmarks for service delivery.

San Bernardino County is one of the most demographically and geographically diverse counties in the United States, encompassing both densely populated urban areas and remote rural communities. The adult education needs in the IAEC region reflect this complexity. A significant portion of the adult population—particularly in economically disadvantaged neighborhoods—lacks a high school diploma, English proficiency, or foundational workforce skills, which are prerequisites for meaningful employment or advancement. In addition, the region continues to experience high poverty rates and low postsecondary attainment compared to state averages, contributing to persistent equity gaps in education and economic mobility.

To understand and respond to these disparities, IAEC employs a multi-pronged approach to data collection. Member Districts contribute enrollment and outcome data through CASAS and TOPSpro Enterprise, which is analyzed at both the local and consortium level. The Consortium also integrates demographic and socioeconomic data from the U.S. Census, American Community Survey (ACS), and Centers of Excellence labor market reports to identify underserved populations and emerging workforce trends. In 2023–2024, IAEC partnered with a professional facilitator to lead consensus-building workshops, where Member Districts and partners collectively reviewed LMI data, mapped existing services, and validated priority needs. These sessions confirmed persistent gaps in four key program areas: High School Diploma/Equivalency, Basic Skills, Career and Technical Education (CTE), and English as a Second Language (ESL).

While many needs are being met through expanded programming, such as new noncredit basic skills math offerings and regional transitions counseling, gaps remain in access to flexible, work-based learning pathways and digital literacy training. To address these, IAEC is developing strategies that include expanding hybrid and online learning models, increasing outreach to underserved populations (including justice-involved individuals, veterans, and disconnected youth), and scaling up industry-recognized credential programs aligned to high-growth sectors. The Consortium also plans to invest in enhanced student support services, such as transition counseling services and career navigation, particularly in areas where geographic distance or lack of transportation remains a barrier.

The adult learners served by IAEC face challenges that are both structural and localized. For instance, rural learners may lack reliable broadband internet or access to in-person instruction, while urban learners may juggle multiple jobs and childcare responsibilities that limit their participation in traditional classroom settings. In response, IAEC is committed to tailoring solutions that reflect the lived experiences of the region's adult population. Through its ongoing partnership with community-based organizations, workforce agencies, and higher education institutions, the Consortium will continue to identify innovative, equity-driven approaches that support adults in overcoming these barriers and engaging in lifelong learning that leads to economic self-sufficiency.

RE: CAEP FY 2025-26 Final Consortium Allocations

This memorandum is to advise local recipients and fiscal agents of adult education program funds on the release of the FY 2025-26 final CAEP allocations. You may access this <u>link</u> to view the final allocation schedule.

Final allocation amounts from the Governor's Budget are now available in NOVA as an allocation amendment. Consortium members will have until September 1, 2025, to submit and certify their amended allocation amounts in NOVA. The CAEP State Leadership and the Technical Assistance Provider (TAP) will offer a CAEP Allocation Amendment webinar on **Monday, July 28, 2025, from 12:00 – 1:00 p.m.** to review the final allocation amounts, provide members with an overview of the NOVA process, and answer questions. You may register for this webinar through this **link**.

State Budget Bill

The State Legislature passed the 2025-26 budget bill that provides a \$15.022 million Proposition 98 increase to support a 2.3% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for the California Adult Education Program. The CAEP baseline apportionment total for FY 2025-26 is now

\$668,159,000. The signed budget reflects a COLA decrease of \$849,000 from the proposed January preliminary budget of \$669,008,000.

NOVA Instructions

The 2025-26 COLA in the final budget is less than what was projected in the preliminary budget. Each consortium shall process this allocation decrease as an allocation amendment in NOVA. This requires a new allocation amount for each member as indicated in the allocation schedule, and certification in NOVA by all consortium members.

Please note that due to State Budget Bill requirements, the State CAEP Office has calculated the allocation amounts for direct-funded member districts and fiscal agents. Please see the 2025-26 allocation schedule linked earlier in this memo. These allocation amounts are the dollar amounts given to the State Controller's Office for disbursement within 45 days of the enactment of the 2025-26 State Budget. Therefore, any deviation from these amounts would not align with the amounts being disbursed. CAEP allocation amendment certification by the consortium and its members must be completed by September 1, 2025.

CAEP Funds Are Restricted Funds

CAEP funds were issued under AB104 legislation and in ARTICLE 9. Adult Education Program [84900 - 84920] of the Education Code. CAEP funds are apportionment, they are not a grant, and at this time are not subject to flexibility. CAEP funds are restricted to adults 18 years and older, can only be used in the seven CAEP approved program areas, and must have an approved regional consortium plan specific to K12 adult education and community college noncredit programs.
