3. Reports

3.1 Legislative Update, Mr. Dana Carter presented:

- February 20, 2026, was the deadline for submitting new bills, and advocates are currently reviewing legislation that may impact education. At this time, no specific bills targeting Adult Education have been identified.
- CCAE & CAEAA are discussing funding for English Learner English Learner (EL) pathway programs. These programs previously received one-time funding to establish them, but there is no ongoing funding to sustain them. Considering a request for \$30 million in ongoing funding to support these programs statewide. The proposal is still being developed, and Dawn Koepke, who works with both organizations, is collaborating with legislators to begin moving the effort forward.
- Discussion included the Community Schools Grant, for which the governor has allocated \$1 billion. Although Adult Education is mentioned, it is not clearly identified as a partner. Currently seeking clarification and advocating for Adult Education to be explicitly included, enabling programs to access and share in the funding opportunities.

4. Discussion Item

4.1 ELL Healthcare Pathway Grant – Round 3, Dr. Emma Diaz presented:

- Two consortium members, Crafton Hills College and Colton Adult School, are interested in applying together for Round 3 of a statewide grant focused on ELL students transitioning into healthcare pathways. This would be the Consortium’s first time applying, as previous rounds did not align with current programming.

- Round 3 is a three-year grant beginning July 1, 2026, with \$50 million available statewide. The grant is open to all 71 consortia, with 25 awards expected. The consortium falls within Band 2. Consortia are encouraged to apply with neighboring consortia, though no outreach has been made yet. Neighboring consortia include Victor Valley, Chaffey, and Riverside.
- The application deadline is March 18. Exploration of the opportunity has been taking place with Crafton Hills College and Colton.
- The committee discussed applying for the grant for the first time, noting it must be submitted as a consortium application with a tight timeline. If pursued, the consortium will need to quickly provide letters of intent, a budget, partner letters, program documentation, and proposed stretch goals.
- The grant aims to establish a regional hub for healthcare and allied health career pathways, with seven identified pathways—such as EMT, paramedic, medical assisting, and dental assisting—though additional programs may also be proposed.
- Examples were shared of other regions collaborating on grant applications, including West Hills, Sequoias, and Kern in the Central Valley; multiple consortia in the far north; and San Mateo and San Francisco City Colleges in the Bay Area.
- The executive committee was asked if there was interest in pursuing the grant, with the note that it would require significant effort in a short timeframe.
- Crafton Hills College has been expanding allied healthcare pathways, including new certificate programs leading to the LVN program starting in fall 2026, and noted the growth of the ESL program aligned with healthcare pathway development. The short timeline and significant effort required were also acknowledged. that the opportunity could support and strengthen these efforts.
- Colton Adult School has been focusing on healthcare pathways, particularly CNA programs, and is already working with English learners. The grant aligns with the Consortium’s focus on ELL and healthcare pathways, and there is interest in exploring the opportunity despite the tight timeline and potential logistical challenges.
- If the consortium decides to pursue the grant, an email will be sent outlining the five required items from each team; the absence of a dedicated grant writer may pose a challenge.
- The application must be submitted through NOVA by the consortium director, but participating agencies will need to quickly gather the required materials.
- Colton Adult School is ready to begin gathering the required materials, with some work already started by the adult school principal.
- Support was offered from the district’s Director of Grants, and coordination with the consortium director will be arranged.

- The team will need to start setting up the application in NOVA, which differs from the CAEP process, and identify fiscal, institutional, and program leads for each participating agency.

Discussion:

- Concerns were raised that the proposed percentage-based allocation model may not be equitable for all programs or support program expansion, and that delays in decision-making could result in limited time to spend the funds.
- It was also noted that the model was selected partly due to time constraints and may not be equitable if used long-term, and questions were raised regarding carryover limits and potential penalties for unspent funds.
- It was clarified that agencies would not be penalized for one year of carryover, as the state requires two years of excessive carryover before requiring a written expenditure plan.

- It was added that the committee recommended distributing the funds now to address concerns about potential future funding declines and to allow agencies to begin planning expenditures sooner.
- Additional comments were made regarding the Consortium’s ability to support collaborative projects and whether distributing funds immediately might limit opportunities for shared initiatives.
- Clarification was requested on whether the proposed allocation model is a one-time decision or an ongoing policy, and it was confirmed that the recommendation applies only to the current COLA funds.

Motion: To approve keeping a 10% reserve of COLA funds to cover increased costs for data and accountability purchasing (ASAP, NEDP, Aztec), and to disperse the remaining COLA funds according to the current allocation schedule, applying only to the 2025–2026 COLA funds.

- CAEAA – San Diego, CA – February 11-13, 2026
 - Mr. Dana Carter reported on the recent CAEAA conference in San Diego, noting a change in format from previous years. The conference included four breakout sessions to gather input from members and partner organizations on the organization’s direction.
 - A legislative representative also spoke, and participants reviewed the data from the breakout sessions to help set priorities for the upcoming year. The revised format, combining information sharing with field input, was considered beneficial.
- CASAS Training @ SBCCD – February 25, 2026
 - Dr. Emma Diaz reported that a CASAS training was held on Wednesday at San Bernardino Valley College as part of the regional model recognized by the state. The center serves as a training hub for the region, and over 50 participants from six consortia attended, including Kern, Palo Verde, Riverside, Chaffey, Mount SAC, and Silver 6.
 - The training was considered very beneficial, providing support for the data submitted on students.

SUBJECT: CAEP 2026-27 Preliminary Allocations

This memorandum advises local recipients and fiscal agents of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2026-27 CAEP preliminary allocations. CAEP Education Code Section 84909 mandates the release of the annual preliminary consortium allocations once the proposed state budget for the upcoming fiscal year is released.

The Governor's proposed budget for 2026-27 includes a \$16.10M cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) increase for CAEP. The COLA re-benchs the total annual statewide CAEP appropriation to \$684,262,000. To view the FY 2026-27 CAEP Preliminary Allocations schedule, [click here](#). The CAEP State Leadership and the Technical Assistance Provider (TAP) will offer a webinar on **Wednesday, March 4, 2026, from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m.**, to review the proposed FY 26-27 budget and preliminary allocations for CAEP. The session will also provide a detailed overview of the Consortium Fiscal Administration Declaration (CFAD) process and how to complete in NOVA. Completing the CFAD

CAEP consortia and their members are required to submit the CFAD via the Chancellor's Office [NOVA](#) system no later than **5:00 PM on May 2, 2026**. The CFAD captures member allocations for each consortium as well as the consortium's chosen disbursement method. The CAEP State Office uses the information from the CFAD process to determine the payment schedules for the disbursement of CAEP funding. There will be no extensions granted for the May 2nd due date. Failure to submit the CFAD by the deadline will result in the State defaulting to the prior year's final allocation distribution.

Please note under Education Code Section 84914, which governs an increase or decrease of CAEP funding from the prior year, that all CAEP members are eligible for the COLA. Consortia cannot vote to exclude or prevent a member from receiving a COLA, provided that the member received funding in the prior year. However, after the CFAD is submitted, consortia may use the allocation amendment process in NOVA to transfer CAEP funding in alignment with consortium approved by-laws.

Consortia will also be requested to identify in the CFAD how it intends to address any excess carryover as outlined by statute. For additional information, you may access the [AB 1491 CAEP policy guidance](#).
